B. Answer the following questions in a sentence each:

I. "someone had blundered"
What does this line mean?

Ans: This line means that the commander had given the wrong command to the Light Brigade to charge forward against the Russian gunners.

II. "Charge for the guns!" He said. Identify the 'he' here?

Ans: The 'he' here refers to the commander of the Light Brigade.

III. 'Theirs not to reply', Why were the soldiers not to reply?

Ans: The spirit of a true soldier in the battlefield was not to answer back, but to do and die out in the field. Since they were disciplined and responsible soldiers, they did not reply.

IV. What did the soldiers of the Light Brigade do with their sabres?

II. Why is the valley described as 'Valley of Death'?

Ans: The valley is described as the 'Valley of Death' because it is a battlefield of the battle of Balaclava where many soldiers are going to meet their end.



III. "Someone had blundered."

How did the soldiers react when they felt that the commander had blundered?

The soldiers obeyed the command of the commander although they felt that Ans: he had blundered.

IV. How were the Russian cannons positioned?

Why does the poet say so?

So, the world wondered in the incredible display of their courage and discipline in cases of complete inefficiency and waste. Consequently, the poet said so.



VIII. What was the impact of the Light Brigade's charge on the enemy?

Ans: The six hundred British soldiers who were less in number and less equipped moved towards the artillery of the enemy through the dense smoke of shelling. They fought bravely with their sabres against the enemy gunners. Their attacks were so fierce that the enemies were torn apart to death.

IX. They that had fought so well. What happened to those soldiers?

Ans: The six hundred British soldiers had fought very courageously and bravely but most of them seriously got injured and some had fallen dead too. They came back from the mouth of hell and through the jaws of death in retreat.

X. "They that had fought so well Came thro' the jaws of Death Back from the mouth of Hell" Explain.

Ans: The soldiers of the Light Brigade faced heavy casualties under the rain of Russian gunners and cannons. After seeing that, the remaining soldiers retreated from the offensive battlefield.

XI. "When can their glory fade?" Why does the poet ask so?

They ride without a question in the enemy area knowing that the outcome could be certainly death. Their sacrifice is symbolic of all those who dedicate their lives for the country.
